Psalm 80 is thought to have been in response to the reading this evening. No king of the Northern Kingdom was described as "he did what was right in the eyes of the Lord". Hoshea was no exception. In a vain attempt to preserve Israel, Hoshea became a subject of the much more powerful king of Assyria. When a less powerful king arose in Assyria, Hoshea attempted to free himself and the Northern Kingdom, Israel, but chose too weak an ally, the king of Egypt. The Assyrian king attacked and destroyed Samaria. The sins of the Northern Kingdom led to their exile. Some fled to Jerusalem in Judah to pray for God to restore of their nation, the land God had promised to their fathers.

Everything about Hoshea's revolt was wrong. He was the wrong king, who picked the wrong fight, against the wrong enemy, and asked the wrong ally for help. Without a doubt, Hoshea thought he had the answers. Hoshea and all the kings of Israel thought they knew best and didn't. Can you imagine this conversation in Hoshea's head? "I'm smart and strong, and with a little clever international politicking—I can defeat this enemy, Assyria, on my own." Not so. Assyria was so much more of a monster than Israel could handle, even with Egypt's help, and they were chewed up and spit out. And after Hoshea's efforts failed, then there was only one choice for Israel, turn back to God who had redeemed them in the past. In the Psalmist's words verses 1-3"Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel, you who lead Joseph like a flock. You who are enthroned upon the cherubim, shine forth. Before Ephraim and Benjamin and Manasseh, stir up your might and come to save us! *Restore* us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved!",

There are times in our lives when we are like Hoshea. We get ourselves into trouble, doing things on our own, following our own wishes and desires. And often, we just make a bigger mess trying to get ourselves out of trouble. We make our plans, sometimes without thought to God's will and purpose in our lives. We pick friends and allies against opponents. We sometimes think, "I'll make all the right moves. I can make things happen to get what I want, and everything will be just fine." We build our own kingdoms with that unholy trinity of Me, Myself and I, and it all comes crashing down. The monsters of sin, sickness, and death eventually chew us up and spit us out.

Since the Garden of Eden, sin has corrupted our hearts. We want to do good but end up sinning, making a mess. We put God aside. We wander and lose heart. We easily get angry. We're a sinful mess. Sometimes all we can do is lament verses 4-6: "O Lord God of hosts, how long will you be angry with your people's prayers? You have fed them with the bread of tears and given them tears to drink in full measure. You make us an object of contention for our neighbors, and our enemies laugh among themselves.

There is good news. In the middle of our lament, in the middle of our mess, the faithfulness of God remains, and He restores his people. God is faithful to fulfill his word, and His word for you is love.

Bask in the steadfast love, the loving faithfulness of Yahweh your God. Listen again to the psalmist in verses 7–10: "Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved! You brought a vine out of Egypt; you drove out the nations and planted it. You cleared the ground for it; it took deep root and filled the land. The mountains were covered with its shade, the mighty cedars with its branches."

God rescued His tender vine, Israel, from death and slavery in Egypt. He prospered them where he planted them. God rescues us from sin, death, and the devil. God restores us when we sin, as he did with Israel. God's plan from before creation was to rescue us, you and me, by sending Jesus to die for the sins of the whole world. Not to enable us to sin, but to save us from our sins. By the power of the Holy Spirit, we repent, we turn back to God, and God restores us. God hears our prayers. Verses 14-15 "Turn again, O God of hosts! Look down from heaven, and see; have regard for this vine, the stock that your right hand planted, and for the son whom you made strong for yourself."

God took care of the mess that was His people. Israel would no longer exist. Only the Southern Kingdom,Judah would be restored. And from Judah would come God's salvation, at just the right time. Kingdoms cameTrinity Lutheran Church, Harvel, IL3Pastor Nehring

and went. But God's steadfast love remains. God's love that sent Jesus to be born in Bethlehem, live a perfect life, die on the cross for your sins and the sins of the whole world, and be raised from the death, to conquer sin, death, and the devil. You have been purchased and redeemed by the Blood of Jesus. Your sins, your messes, are forgiven.

By the cross and empty tomb, Jesus Christ saves and restores you and me and all his people. In the midst of our lament and mess, God is faithful to restore. Psalm 80 ends:

Let your hand be on the man of your right hand, the son of man whom you have made strong for yourself! Then we shall not turn back from you; give us life, and we will call upon your name! *Restore* us, O Lord God of hosts! Let your face shine, that we may be saved! (vv 17–19, emphasis added)

The words of the Psalmist came to life in the manger! Amen
