#### Sermon

Grace, Mercy and Peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

It's a trap! We've all watched to programs and movies where we know that it is a trap. An ambush. We may have even screamed at the TV, trying to warn the person not to wander haplessly into a trap. Of course, the hero always manages to escape the trap and save the day.

As we continue with Holy Week readings in this morning's gospel, the Pharisees form a new alliance, this time with the Herodians, to try to trap Jesus. We don't know much about the Herodians, but if this were a melodrama, we'd boo and hiss, just because their name contains Herod, bringing up memories of the Holy Innocents, the babies in Bethlehem killed by Herod the King after the Magi return home via another route. Or perhaps the Herod the tetrarch who beheaded John the Baptist as a reward to his niece/stepdaughter for a seductive dance at a party. Isn't a bit odd that the Pharisees who hoped that a return to ritual purity would cause God's favor and restore David's kingdom over Israel would partner with the Herodians, part of the ruling power of Rome? Even in those days, politics made for strange bedfellows. And then the question "Is it right to pay taxes to Caesar?" after being buttered up about Jesus's impartiality and truthfulness. Jesus sees the trap and answers "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's" verdict, leaving his opponents marveling and frustrated that Jesus slipped through the trap unscathed.

This lesson gives us an opportunity to consider our situation just two weeks before the election. Let's start with the 4<sup>th</sup> commandment "Honor your Father and your Mother". As Luther explains in the Small Catechism "What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise or anger our parents and other authorities, but honor them, serve and obey them, love and cherish them. Luther's Germany was not a democracy but a dictatorship with each area ruled by a Prince. Our political environment is a democratic republic in which we each have the opportunity to vote as part of the process to elect our government. In fact, many would say responsibility, not opportunity. Luther would likely say responsibility. Luther teaches two important concepts which shaped his understanding.

First, Luther taught two kinds of righteousness, righteousness before God and righteousness before man. Our righteousness before God is God's work alone. Jesus's death and resurrection makes us righteous before God. There is nothing you can do to be righteous before God. We are passively righteous before God. Ephesians 2:8-9 says it so well "8 For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, 9 not a result of works, so that no one may boast." And then there is our righteousness before man. This is our active righteousness, the third use of the Law, a guide. Before man, we struggle to love our neighbor as ourselves. These are the good works that Ephesians 2:10 talks about "10 For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." Luther aptly summarized "God doesn't need our good works, but our neighbor does." This sets Lutherans apart.

Second, Luther describes the two Kingdoms, the kingdom of the right, God's Kingdom and the kingdom of the left, the rulers and authorities God has placed over us. Let that last statement sink in. The rulers and authorities God has placed over us. Who watched the presidential debate? How clear was it that the two participants are a gift of God to us? Was the 8<sup>th</sup> commandment broken? Did either or both parties "put the best construction on" or as the newer catechisms say "explain everything in the kindest way"?. We live in God's Kingdom as saints, passively righteous, washed clean by the innocent, bitter sufferings and death of Jesus Christ. We live in the kingdom of the left as a sinner who struggles to actively live righteously before men and sins and falls short of the glory of God. As we live in the kingdom of the left, we are called to be faithful witnesses to God's law and gospel. We are called to be God's voice in the world around us.

God has always used humans to influence and shape history. Sadly, the church of Germany fell eerily quiet during the Hitler's rise to power and during World War II. In many ways, many Americans are also practicing

the same quietism, the unwillingness to speak against the immorality of our times. As we look at the many challenges facing the United States today, it is more important than ever before to make our Christian voices heard, especially to advocate for those who do not have a voice, the lives unable to speak for or protect themselves, the pre-born children, the disabled, and the elderly. We also have the responsibility to stand up for the family which is also under attack.

God calls us to care for our neighbor, for those around us, those in our community and nation. One way we do so is through our participation in government. For some, doing so leads to a political vocation, serving in an office. For most others, doing so means exercising our right and responsibility to vote according to our conscience and as God would have us vote, upholding God's Law. Our righteousness before others demands that we become informed voters who view government as God's temporal authorities who bear the sword for the punishment of wrongdoers and for the benefit of those who follow the laws.

Too often, we, myself included, want to avoid the ugliness of American politics in which the 8<sup>th</sup> commandment, "You shall not bear false witness" or the more modern translation "You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor" is trampled underfoot. Debates in which name calling and eye rolling carry more meaning than the content of the discussion. Political rallies in which emotion are more important than content. And yet because we have a voice in the process, we should be faithful stewards who prayerfully consider the candidates, positions, and ballot items and make our Christian voices be heard by voting.

Our Gospel readings are from early in Holy Week; we know how Holy Week ends. Jesus allows himself to come under Pontius Pilate's authority and surrenders His life for our sins. Jesus takes our sins to the cross and dies a scandalous, horrible death for the times we fail be faithful stewards, rendering to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's. For the times we fail to honor the authorities placed over us, and the laws of the land. The times we fail to act righteously towards our neighbors. The times when we see God's blessings as something we own, not something we steward. Jesus's death makes us righteous before God who calls us to be His children, sons and daughters of our heavenly Father. Jesus's resurrection confirms that Jesus has conquered sin, death and the devil. Jesus has reconciled us to the Father that we may be brought to faith by the Holy Spirit and live in God's Kingdom, the Kingdom of the Right while we also live in the Kingdom of the Left, this world, where we live our faith and proclaim Jesus as Savior as we love and serve our neighbor, especially as we make our voices heard in the upcoming election. Amen. And now, may the peace of God which surpasses all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus to life everlasting. Amen.
