Sermon

Grace, Mercy and Peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen

Sometimes, we take the cross for granted. Growing up Roman Catholic, one made the sign of the cross on oneself so frequently, so automatically, almost completely without thought. Each time one walked into a church, one dipped one's hand in Holy Water and made the sign of the cross. Each time one prayed at a meal, the prayer began and ended with the sign of the cross. Mass itself began and ended with the sign of the cross. Some baseball players make the sign of the cross when they step up to bat. Some wear a cross but when asked don't consider themselves Christians or are no longer practicing Christians, leaving me wondering why they continued to wear a cross.

But, after becoming a Lutheran, I intentionally stopped making the sign of the cross. The Lutherans I knew didn't make the sign of the cross. That was too "Roman Catholic". We said the words, but we didn't do the physical motions. It distinguished my Lutheranism. People I grew up with, including my siblings, noticed. At first it felt strange. But over time it became more normal, more natural. I've even been asked about saying the words to begin a public prayer. But lately, especially here in Southern Illinois, I see more and more Lutherans making the sign of the cross, especially Pastors.

As you have heard over the last two weeks, Paul is writing to the Corinthians who have sunk back into their heathen practices. Instead of being unified in Christ, they have divided up into cliques. They have chosen division over unity, based on who brought them to faith. They have lost sight of Jesus as their savior. They forgot what Jesus did for them. Jesus took the punishment for their sins and the sins of the whole world, unlike everyone else who has faced capital punishment for his or her own sins. Imagine the disgrace and shame of being put to death for a crime. And even more so if you did not do the crime.

Today, capital punishment doesn't exist in the state of Illinois and 22 other states. In states where capital punishment exists, it is most often by lethal injection and even if not, involves a sedative. This is a far cry from Roman Capital Punishment. Roman crucifixion was reserved for the worst of the worst. Crucifixion was reserved for slaves, pirates, and enemies of the state. Crucifixion was a public spectacle intended to deter others from committing the same crime. Crucifixion was a gruesome spectacle, the most painful and humiliating death imaginable. Even after flogging, being beaten with leather whips with bone or metal embedded, crucifixion was a slow death taking hours to days brought on by a combination of being unable to lift oneself up to breathe, exposure, heart trauma, and blood issues. And after death, the body was often left on the cross as a deterrent and eaten by animals. Is it any wonder that those outside of Christianity would find the Cross offensive and non-sensical? Only the lowest of the low, the worst of the worst were crucified.

Have you ever said to yourself or someone else "I wouldn't have done it that way?" For those without faith, it makes no sense. Why would God send His Son into our flesh to begin with? Much less send His Son into our flesh to die such a horrible, scandalous death? Could God have come up with another way? Maybe. But God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life (John 3:16). Not to condemn the world but to save the world through Him. To suffer the punishment that your sins and my sins deserve. To suffer the punishment that all sins over all time deserve. Jesus was forsaken on the cross. Separated from the Father by the sins He bore for you and for me. Mark records "And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Mark 15:34)

Dying on the cross, Jesus paid your sin debt. Jesus took your sins to His cross and paid the full price. The full price for sins you have committed and sins you will commit. Sins of not loving the Lord your God with all your heart and mind and soul. Sins of not loving your neighbor as yourself. Sins of having other gods such as wisdom or knowledge, thinking that you know better than God. Having gods of money and wealth. Desiring things other than God's Word. Allowing other things to take your attention off God. Wanting things that are not given to you, be it relationships or possessions. Not being content with what God has given you. Excusing your sins as too small or too insignificant compared to the sins of others. Not giving thanks to God for all good things and turning to God in times of trouble.

During the Heidelberg Disputation in 1518, Luther points out that it does no good to recognize God in His Glory without recognizing the shame and humiliation that Jesus suffered on the Cross. God can only be found in suffering and the cross. The power of God can be seen in nature. The grace of God can only be seen in God's Word and Sacraments, on the cross and in the Lord's Supper, which appear foolish and weak to the world. God empowers His Church through the Holy Spirit to proclaim the Good News of God's Salvation. His church reveals his grace and glory, which you will see when Jesus comes again. God's glory is revealed in His people, joined with the church Triumphant, the church of all time joined in faith to Jesus Christ, the church's head.

There is only one God, the Father of our Lord, and Savior Jesus Christ. You are not a god unto yourself. You are subject to God, your Creator, Sustainer and Defender. God protects you from harm and danger and all evil, all out of His divine, gracious goodness. Not because of who you are. Not because you desire His love. Not because of what you do, for you can add nothing to your relationship with God. But because God loves and gives grace to His people. All religions don't lead to heaven. Hell is real. God is a just God who must punish evil and unrighteousness. God is not a doting Grandfather type who looks the other way when one sins. Instead, God hates evil. God sent Jesus to die for you sins and the sins of the whole world. You were bought by Jesus's innocent, precious blood shed on the cross, the emblem of shame and disgrace. Jesus died to give you eternal life. Jesus died so that you will not die eternally. The Holy Spirit works in you, bringing you to

faith, connecting you to the Body of Christ, the Church, where you learn of God's Love, Mercy and Grace. The Holy Spirit gives you both the opportunities and the words to speak God's Word and forgiveness to those around you. The Holy Spirit makes you holy, a people set apart to proclaim the wonders of God. Called by the Holy Spirit to the waters of Baptism, you have put on Jesus Christ and him Crucified for the sins of the world. You are a forgiven child of God, an heir of the kingdom of heaven both during your life and after you are called home. You are a redeemed child of God, an heir of all eternity both here in this world and there in eternity. Amen.

And now, may the peace of God which surpasses all understanding keep you heart and mind in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.
