<sup>1</sup>As [Jesus] passed by, he saw a man blind from birth. <sup>2</sup>And his disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" <sup>3</sup>Jesus answered, "It was not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that the works of God might be displayed in him. <sup>4</sup>We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work. <sup>5</sup>As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." <sup>6</sup>Having said these things, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva. Then he anointed the man's eyes with the mud <sup>7</sup>and said to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). So he went and washed and came back seeing.

<sup>8</sup>The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar were saying, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" <sup>9</sup>Some said, "It is he." Others said, "No, but he is like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." <sup>10</sup>So they said to him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" <sup>11</sup>He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud and anointed my eyes and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' So I went and washed and received my sight." <sup>12</sup>They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

<sup>13</sup>They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. <sup>14</sup>Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. <sup>15</sup>So the Pharisees again asked him how he had received his sight. And he said to them, "He put mud on my eyes, and I washed, and I see." <sup>16</sup>Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not keep the Sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner do such signs?" And there was a division among them. <sup>17</sup>So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him, since he has opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet."

<sup>18</sup>The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight, until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight <sup>19</sup>and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" <sup>20</sup>His parents answered, "We know that this is our son and that he was born blind. <sup>21</sup>But how he now sees we do not know, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." <sup>22</sup>(His parents said these things because they feared the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that if anyone should confess Jesus to be Christ, he was to be put out of the synagogue.) <sup>23</sup>Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

<sup>24</sup>So for the second time they called the man who had been blind and said to him, "Give glory to God. We know that this man is a sinner." <sup>25</sup>He answered, "Whether he is a sinner I do not know. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see." <sup>26</sup>They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" <sup>27</sup>He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?" <sup>28</sup>And they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. <sup>29</sup>We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from." <sup>30</sup>The man answered, "Why, this is an amazing thing! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. <sup>31</sup>We know that God does not listen to sinners, but if anyone is a worshiper of God and does his will, God listens to him. <sup>32</sup>Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a man born blind. <sup>33</sup>If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." <sup>34</sup>They answered him, "You were born in utter sin, and would you teach us?" And they cast him out.

<sup>35</sup>Jesus heard that they had cast him out, and having found him he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" <sup>36</sup>He answered, "And who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" <sup>37</sup>Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and it is he who is speaking to you." <sup>38</sup>He said, "Lord, I believe," and he worshiped him. <sup>39</sup>Jesus said, "For judgment I came into this world, that those who do not see may see, and those who see may become blind." <sup>40</sup>Some of the Pharisees near him heard these things, and said to him, "Are we also blind?" <sup>41</sup>Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would have no guilt; but now that you say, 'We see,' your guilt remains."

#### Sermon

Grace, Mercy, and Peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

When I lived in St. Louis, it seemed that most murders happened in the wee hours of the morning. It seemed rare when a murder was committed outside of the first three or four hours of day. Yet, for most of us, the idea of being out and about between 12 midnight and 4 am is far-fetched. We are inside if not sleeping then. And so, it seems highly unlikely that one of us would be a homicide victim in St. Louis. It isn't that any murder victim is more evil or sinful. It isn't whether you are Christian or not. It isn't about whether you are poor or rich. But what seems to keep one from being a victim of a deadly crime, is not being outside, especially the wee hours of the morning. Years ago, to reduce crime in the city of St. Louis, city government installed streetlights throughout the entire city. At first, there was a marked decrease in crime, but the trend reversed. While light had initially overcome the darkness and the crime associated with darkness, the darkness and crime, at least in the city of St. Louis, has overcome the light.

In today's Epistle, Paul writes to the Ephesians to encourage them in the faith. Paul uses the gospel instead of the law to inform living the Christian life. Paul has been clear in the readings for Lent from Romans and the Letter to the Ephesians. Life in Christ is a freely given gift, not something accomplished on their own. The often-quoted Ephesian 2:8-10 spells this out very clearly "8 For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, 9 not a result of works, so that no one may boast. <sup>10</sup> For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them."

Paul knows the culture the Ephesians Christians had come out of. And Paul knows the temptations to return to that culture surround these believers. The devil, the sinful world, and their own sinful nature surrounding these Christians is as bad or worse than today.

It is easy to mishear or misunderstand the first part of verse 8. "for at one time you were darkness". Since the fall into sin, every human born, except one, has been born a sinful enemy of God, whose very nature is sinful and evil. It is not that we are simply immersed in darkness. It is that we are sinful. We are enemies of God. Without God's grace and mercy, we stand completely and total depraved. Without God's grace and mercy, we are active enemies of God. Without God, our entire being is evil.

But God does not leave you in your sin. You were not created to remain a condemned enemy of God. Instead, God's plan from before creation was to send Jesus, the Light of the World, to overcome sin, death, and the devil on your behalf. In the waters of Baptism, you became a child of the light. You are no longer a child of darkness. You are no longer totally evil. Your transformation was complete and total. But your sinful nature remains. Your sinful nature attracts you back to the darkness. But you are to walk as a child of light, in goodness, righteousness and truth. While the Law serves as a curb, mirror and guide, the Law also tempts and accuses. Paul writes in Romans 7:7-11 "7 What then shall we say? That the law is sin? By no means! Yet if it had not been for the law, I would not have known sin. For I would not have known what it is to covet if the law had not said, "You shall not covet." But sin, seizing an opportunity through the commandment, produced in me all kinds of covetousness. For apart from the law, sin lies dead. I was once alive apart from the law, but when the commandment came, sin came alive, and I died. The very commandment that promised life proved to be death to me. For sin, seizing an opportunity through the commandment, deceived me and through it killed me." Sin calls you into the darkness and darkens you by separating you from God.

The Holy Spirit dwells within you, enlightening your life. The Holy Spirit leads you to seek what is good and right and pleasing to the Lord. The Holy Spirit calls you to repent when sin enters your life and forgives your sins. The Holy Spirit causes you to walk in the good works God has created for you. Not to earn or merit your righteousness before God. But in response to the unmerited gift given you in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. The gift of the Holy Spirit lights your life and your way. You know God's ways and thoughts as God has revealed them in His Inspired Word, the Scriptures. The Scriptures reveal God's good and gracious will as Paul tells Timothy (1 Timothy 2:3-6) "<sup>3</sup> This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, <sup>4</sup> who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. <sup>5</sup> For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man<sup>[a]</sup> Christ Jesus, <sup>6</sup> who gave himself as a ransom for all, which is the testimony given at the proper time."

Yet the world claims to know what is good and right and true. Yet the ways of the world lead to darkness. In opposition to God's Word, the world teaches that sex between any two people is good instead of sex being intended for procreation and mutual encouragement of two married people of the opposite sex. And what is the result? Sexually transmitted diseases, untimely pregnancies, and exploitation of those involved in premarital sex. The world teaches that living together prepares a couple for a successful marriage when in fact those living together are far more likely to divorce than those who haven't lived together. Mental Health challenges abound. Suicide rates for children and teens are at all-time highs. And only too often, new technology leads to accepting "what we can do" instead of "what should we do". Can surgery and hormone treatments cause a male body to look like a female body? Yes. But what are the consequences? What psychological impacts are there? While we have unprecedented access to facts and data, we also have unprecedented access to pornography. While we have almost unlimited access via Social Media to have open and honest discussion of ideas and thought, Social Media breeds discord and isolation. It is not unusual to see a family gathered for a meal yet isolated by their screens, engaging those not present instead of enjoying the company and fellowship of those present. And often, when we as believers call out the works of darkness, we are met with opposition and hate, being called bigots and haters.

You are the light of the world. The Light of Jesus dwells within you. Jesus died to bring you out of your darkness into His marvelous light. And because Jesus died for your sins, you seek God's Will and Way. Your eyes are focused on eternity, not on the things of this earth. Assured of your salvation, you shine God's marvelous light into this sin-darkened world and into the sin-darkened lives of those around you. You look forward to being in God's kingdom for all eternity, basking in the light of Jesus, your Lord and Savior. Amen.

And now, may the peace of God which surpasses all understanding keep you heart and mind in Christ Jesus to life everlasting. Amen.
