Sermon

Grace, Mercy, and Peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

In St. Louis, where you went to High School says a lot about you, where you grew up and likely what your family's socio-economic status was. Most Ladue kids had affluent parents, while Ritenour kids had blue collar parents. And even amongst Catholic High Schools, Kennedy High School kids from West County were better off than the DuBourg kids from South St. Louis. And while years often separated alumni, there was a sense of comradery amongst the graduates of a particular High School. They had something in common.

Paul writes to the house churches in Rome at an interesting point in the young Christian church's life. The Jews had been expelled from Rome by the Emperor Claudius in 49 AD. This was the third time. The first time in 139 BC was for corrupting Roman morals. The second time in 19 AD was because the Jews "were flocking to Rome and converting many". Keep in mind that in Rome, besides the gods of Greek and Roman mythology, the emperor considered and proclaimed himself to be a god. Still, the Jews were allowed to practice their religion. This third time was different. Claudius expelled the Jews for "rioting over Chrestus", likely an errant transliteration of Christ. Paul's experience certainly bore out this conflict. In each city Paul visited, he encountered Jews who resisted and fought against Paul's proclamation of Jesus as the Christ, the Messiah. Christianity was seen as a sect of Judaism, and thus allowed in the Roman Empire. In 54 AD, shortly after the death of Claudius, the Jews began to return to Rome and re-integrate into the house churches of Rome. But how would they be received? Would the churches accept the Jews back into fellowship or would there be Gentile Christian Churches and Jewish Christian Churches?

While Paul was certainly the apostle to the Gentiles, Paul was Jewish, and if you will, went to a Jewish High School. Paul's heart ached for his people, the Jews. The case was so compelling for Paul that he struggled to understand why the Jews rejected Jesus. The Jews had the big picture of God's Plan of Salvation throughout

their Scriptures, the Old Testament, the same Old Testament that Protestant Christianity uses today. As a trained Jewish Scholar, Paul knew the Old Testament. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Paul saw clearly the prophecies point to Jesus as the Messiah.

In Romans 9, Paul prays for the people of Israel, the descendants of those who received God's promises and became God's people. God's promises remain. God promised to bless all nations through Abraham. God promised to raise up a king from David's line, a descendent of Isaac and Jacob. God always stands behind his promises.

Just as Jesus was willing to lay aside himself, to take on your sins and the sins of the whole world, so too Paul stands ready to lay aside himself, his faith, that the Jews might come to faith in Jesus. Paul has placed such a great value on his faith in Jesus as His Lord and Savior that he has suffered greatly. Paul expounds in 2 Corinthians 11:23-27 "²³ Are they servants of Christ? I am a better one—I am talking like a madman—with far greater labors, far more imprisonments, with countless beatings, and often near death. ²⁴ Five times I received at the hands of the Jews the forty lashes less one. ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods. Once I was stoned. Three times I was shipwrecked; a night and a day I was adrift at sea; ²⁶ on frequent journeys, in danger from rivers, danger from robbers, danger from my own people, danger from Gentiles, danger in the city, danger in the wilderness, danger at sea, danger from false brothers; ²⁷ in toil and hardship, through many a sleepless night, in hunger and thirst, often without food, ^[b] in cold and exposure." Despite all of that, Paul wishes to lay aside his precious faith, that the people of Israel would come to faith.

Likely, you know someone who has abandoned the faith. Some intentionally with forethought; some simply got out of the habit of coming to church. You know the heartache that Paul feels. And you don't know what to do about it, how to handle the situation. The most difficult conversations about faith are often with those we are the closest to. You may be intimidated, fearing alienation. You can lose sight of the big picture. Your loved one's eternal salvation hangs in the balance. You are on God's mission. You are God's ambassador. God places you into situations and relationships so that you may be His heart, voice, hands and feet. The Holy Spirit gives you words to speak Jesus into the world, and especially into the lives of those around you. The Holy Spirit gives you your proclamation and uses your proclamation to bring about faith in others.

Paul shows you how to begin. Paul's heart aches for his relatives, especially those resisting the faith. Paul's heart aches fearing divisions in the church. Paul responds lovingly with prayer, offering himself to others in Christian Love and Service. Paul's heart aligns with Jesus's heart. Paul's mission is the Father's mission that was entrusted to Jesus first, then Paul and the Apostles, all the way down to you and I. Paul's words are winsome and sweet. Paul welcomes all into God's family; sinners who need a savior. Sinners whose actions don't always align with their faith.

As God's chosen people, Israel sinned repeatedly, turning to other gods. Israel lost sight of God's promises, God's mercy and forgiveness. Israel transgressed God's Law, bringing upon themselves the consequences of their sins. But, throughout the Old Testament, God shows His faithfulness when Israel was unfaithful. Despite the opinions of many, the Old Testament shows us the Gospel by showing us God's Grace and forgiveness to Israel, not just the Law.

We too are sinners, too apt to stray. Influence by the culture, the world around us, we see ourselves as most important. We count our needs and desires as more than others. We are too quick to bend and break the rules for our own benefit. We lose sight of who we are and whose we are. Isaiah writes "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned everyone to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." (Isaiah 53:6)

God remains faithful to His chosen, both the Israelites of the Old Testament and the bride of Jesus, the New Testament church. The Holy Spirit moves us to repent and confess our sins and then forgives our sins, keeping us in the one true faith with Jesus in His church, the family of all believers, according to His promises. God

uses our voices, hearts, hands and feet just as he did Paul's. We too seek the unity of the church, both here in Harvel, around the United States, and around the world, without compromising God's Word, the Law which accuses and convicts and the Gospel which proclaims that Jesus came to save sinners, of which I am the worst. We lift those in our lives and those we encounter in prayer, asking that the Holy Spirit would work saving faith in these individuals that each may know that God so loved the world and each of us that He sent His Son to be our Savior, to take our sins to His cross and take our punishment to fulfill God's promises. We live as His redeemed children and wait for God to bring His Chosen of all time into the new heavens and the new earth to rule and reign with Him for all eternity. Amen. And now, may the peace of God which surpasses all understanding keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen. Stand
