Sermon

Grace, Mercy, and Peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Over the next 14 weeks, our Epistle readings will be from Romans. Romans is a full and exhaustive doctrinal treatise, the most systematic and complete of all of Paul's Epistles, proclaiming the divine counsel of grace and salvation for all, Jew and Greek alike.

In this morning's epistle, Paul examines the promises made to Abraham, Abraham's faith, Abraham's righteousness before God, and the promises God makes you, your faith, and your righteousness.

God chose to make a name for Abram, to whom God would give the name Abraham in Genesis 12, immediately following the Tower of Babel "⁴ Then they said, "Come, let us build ourselves a city and a tower with its top in the heavens, and let us make a name for ourselves, lest we be dispersed over the face of the whole earth." (Genesis 11:4) What a striking contrast! Mankind wants to do it themselves. Even Abraham succumbed to the temptation to "do it himself" sometimes. Abram goes to Egypt and fearing for his own life, despite God's promises, lies about his relationship with Sarai, bringing curses on Pharoah. Abram consents to Sarai's plan for Hagar to bear Ishmael to help God deliver on God's promises, bringing turmoil into Abram's house. Even after being promised Isaac within the year, Abraham again lies about his relationship with Sarah, bringing curses upon Abimelech. And despite all of this, God is faithful to God's promises to Abraham.

"Do it yourself" is the prevailing theme in this world. Do what makes sense to you. Do what is right in your own eyes. Rules and laws are only for those who want to follow them. If you are not happy about something in your life, change it, no matter how fundamental. After all, it is your life. And you have rights. The world makes it clear that marriage is only about the two people involved, not children and family. The world teaches

that doing what makes you happy is all that is important; you get to make your own rules. The world does its best to force God out of the picture. That is what Satan wants. Examples are everywhere, from premarital sex to living together outside of marriage, to making Illinois a destination for abortion, losing sight of God's commands to protect all life.

While it is easy to wag a judgmental finger at the world, the church too struggles with a "do it yourself mentality". There are basically two religions – one in which you "do it yourself" and one in which God does it for you. Either you are working out your own salvation or God has given you your salvation. Said differently, your salvation is either based on observing the Law or the gift of the Gospel. Any attempts to combine the two are contaminated by the Law.

The Law comes naturally. We are born sinful and unclean. From a baby's first breath, the baby is solely focused on herself. A baby cries, and her needs are met. She is fed or changed or held. As we get older, we learn that if we do what we are told, good things follow. For those of us who are older, doing what we were told meant that we weren't physically disciplined. We learn to play our parents against one another to get our way. We learn which parent to ask for specific things. We learn boundaries. We find that when we do x, y happens. We feel good when we can point to an accomplishment and receive the reward.

The Gospel is foreign to us. In this world, there is no free lunch. If it seems too good to be true, it probably is. In this world, someone is always trying to take advantage of others. Scammers abound, deceiving trusting souls. Satan and his fallen angels are hard at work to take us from the safe confines of God's provision and promises.

The Law always accuses. The Law points out where we fall short, and how often we fall short. Luther struggled with the Law. Luther's conscience was formed by the Church's teaching that Christians were called to live a life of penance, not of repentance. The Sacrament of Penance had three tenets – contrition, being sorry for sins, confession, listing sins, and penance, doing good works to make up for sins. To be forgiven, sins had to be listed so that penance could be assigned and done. This left Luther always questioning whether Luther would be saved or damned; whether Luther would go to heaven or to hell.

Luther's struggles with sin led him to Romans where salvation is a freely given gift of God, not something to be earned. Your relationship with God is based solely on God's Grace and Mercy, God's promises to you, just as to Abraham, are solely based on God's grace and mercy. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, God calls you into a gracious, loving relationship with Him. You can only receive in this relationship. Your only choice is to reject God's gift of salvation. As Luther teaches in the Third Article, "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith." Because of God's great love for you, you respond to God's grace and mercy. Ephesians 2:8-10 "⁸ For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, ⁹ not a result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹⁰ For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them."

You are, however, active in your relationships with others. And that is where the good works just mentioned come in. God works through you to love and serve others. But that is also where sin comes in. Other gods take God's place in your life. You don't always pray, praise, and give thanks to God as you should. Sometimes you misuse God's name. Sometimes, your trust in God takes a back seat to your trust in yourself, or material things. Sometimes your relationship with God is overcome by the things of this world that seem more urgent, more important, in the moment than being in God's Word, praying or worshiping. You don't always respect and honor those in authority over you. You want what you want, not necessarily what God has given you. You don't always love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind and soul. You don't always love your neighbor as yourself. Like Abraham, sometimes, you place your trust in yourself and not in God and his promises.

Just like Abraham, God has promised you to be in relationship with you. To provide for you. To forgive you when you repent and confess. To be faithful even when you are not. God graciously gives you what you do not deserve at the expense of Jesus who laid down His life to redeem you. Jesus died so that you will not die eternally. This is truly God's gift to you and to everyone one around you, just as faith was given to Abraham. Abraham relied of God's promises, as yet unseen. Abraham trusted God's promise to send a savior. And God sent Jesus who died for you. For your sins. To graciously mark your sin debt " paid". Just as God was faithful to Abraham, so God is faithful with you, calling you to faith, redeeming you from sin, and promising you eternal life in His kingdom which has no end. Amen.
